

## Incidence of Child Sexual Abuse in Maryland

## Introduction

- According to the United States Census Bureau, 22.1% of individuals living in Maryland are children.<sup>1</sup>
- In 2020, the total population of children in Maryland was 1,365,166.<sup>1</sup>
- The Maryland Department of Human Resources, Child Protective Services (CPS), receives reports of "sexual abuse of minors." **Sexual abuse** cases involve perpetrators who are family or household members, or someone with care, custody, or supervision of a minor child.<sup>2</sup>
  - Cases where the perpetrator is not a family or household member, or someone with care, custody, or supervision of a minor child, are categorized as general sex crimes such as *rape* or *sexual* offense, and are investigated by law enforcement without involving CPS.<sup>2</sup>

## **Maryland Statistics**

- In 2020, there were 1,365,166 children in Maryland.¹ Of those children, **7,242** were victims of child abuse or neglect.³
  - 28.4% of the child abuse or neglect that occurred in Maryland in 2020 was sexual abuse, meaning 2,059 Maryland children experienced sexual abuse.<sup>3</sup> This is an increase of 3.4% from 2019
- The percentage of victims of child sexual abuse in Maryland is **significantly higher** than the national average of **9%**.<sup>3</sup>

## **U.S. Statistics**

- Only about one third of child sexual abuse incidents are identified, and even fewer are reported.<sup>4</sup>
- About 38% of child victims disclose the fact that they have been sexually abused.<sup>5</sup> Some, almost 60%, never disclose.<sup>6</sup>
- Of those who do disclose, **40**% tell a close friend, rather than an adult or person in a position of authority.<sup>6</sup>
- 93% of children who are victims of child sexual abuse know their abuser.<sup>7</sup>
- In general, 1 in 10 children will be sexually abused before the age of 18.8
- Of all children who are sexually abused, 20% are abused before the age of 8.9
