

Background

Across the country, states are working to eliminate the backlog of rape kits (also known as sexual assault evidence kits, or SAEKs) that have not been tested.

Since 2017, agencies in Maryland have teamed up to test all eligible rape kits for potential DNA evidence, provide services to victims, investigate more sexual assaults, and prosecute cases.

Maryland’s work on this is funded by the National Sexual Assault Kit Initiative (SAKI), whose goal is to support victims and seek justice for these crimes.

Terms to Know

Rape Kit:

Also known as a sexual assault evidence kit, or SAEK, rape kits are used during a sexual assault forensic exam to collect potential evidence of the sexual assault.

Forensic Testing:

Analysis that assists in identifying foreign DNA profiles that may be used to help identify a perpetrator.

Unsubmitted SAEK:

A rape kit that was not sent to a crime lab for forensic testing.

Untested SAEK:

A rape kit that was sent to a crime lab for forensic testing, but has not been tested.

Victim Notification:

The opportunity for survivors to receive information and updates about the testing of their previously unsubmitted or untested rape kit.

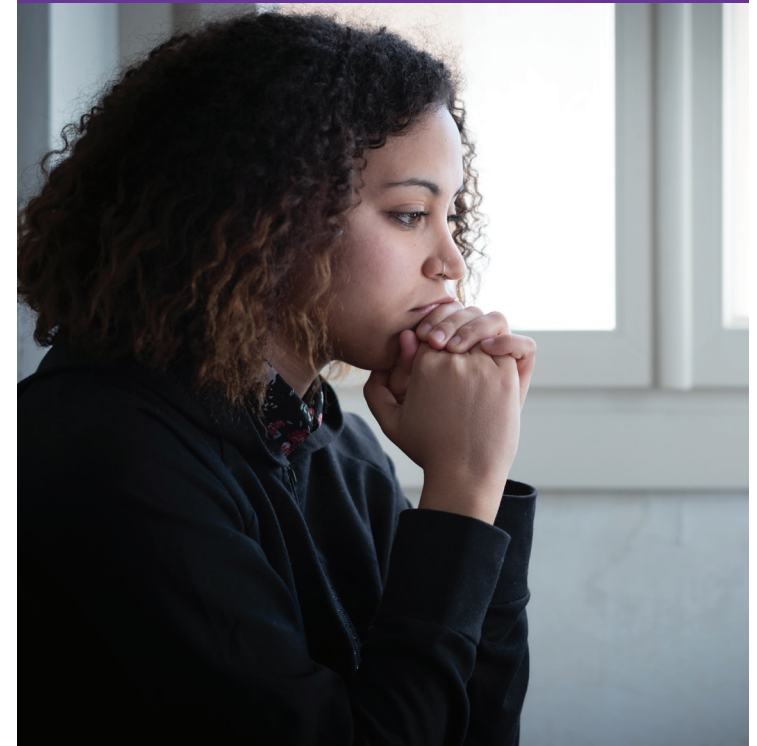

What to Expect

It is natural for survivors affected by the backlog to feel overwhelmed or confused. **Fear, anxiety, and anger are all normal responses.** MCASA's SAKI Victim Advocates want to help limit the emotional stress you may feel by giving you the ability to control your involvement in this process.

You will be working with an MCASA SAKI Advocate who is dedicated to providing you with ongoing support. You will have the opportunity to meet with law enforcement to discuss your kit and ask questions about your case. The advocate will be available to participate in any meetings with law enforcement to ensure that your safety and privacy are prioritized, and that your needs and concerns are addressed.

When you first speak with an MCASA SAKI Advocate and law enforcement, you will receive a genuine apology for having to wait years for your kit to be tested, and for any uncertainty you may have had about your case. From this point forward, you can expect to be involved in your case however you feel is best for you.



Survivor Notification Protocol

You may be wondering, 'how will I be contacted?' The answer is up to you. If you would like to start receiving notifications, you can do so at any time by calling our information line or emailing us. MCASA SAKI Advocates also reach out to survivors who have not opted in.



When you first speak with an MCASA SAKI Advocate, you can outline how, when, and why you are contacted about your kit. The advocate will guide you through the process and explain notification options, including phone, email or mail, and in-person or video meetings. Once your kit has been tested, you will be contacted based on your preferences.



An MCASA SAKI Advocate may ask if you would like to meet with law enforcement about your kit. This meeting is optional, and could take place before or after your kit has been tested. Law enforcement can provide case-related information and answer questions regarding the investigation. You can choose to have a MCASA SAKI Advocate present at this meeting to provide emotional support and service referrals.

You will continue to receive updates about your case according to your contact preferences, which you can change at any time. You will also be given the contact information for your MCASA SAKI Advocate and law enforcement so that you can reach out with questions or concerns.

We understand survivors may need time to process the information they receive, and the emotions that arise, during the notification process. With that in mind, the team knows that you may need time and space before you can make any decisions regarding your case.

Each MCASA SAKI Advocate is:

- Dedicated to protecting the privacy and safety of survivors;
- Committed to providing survivors with a voice during this process;
- Prepared to meet unique needs of each survivor;
- Available to listen to your concerns, answer your questions, and provide you with information and resources.
