

Sexual Violence Against Black & African American Women

FACT SHEET

- **1 in 4** Black girls will be sexually abused before the age of 18.¹
- **1 in 5** Black women are survivors of rape.¹
- **35%** of Black women experienced some form of contact of sexual violence during their lifetime.¹
- **40-60%** of Black women report being subjected to coercive sexual contact by age 18.¹
- **17%** of Black women experienced sexual violence other than rape by an intimate partner during their lifetime.¹
- In a two-year review done by the FBI of all suspected human trafficking incidents, **40%** of victims of sex trafficking were African American.
 - African American children comprise **57%** of child prostitution arrests.²
 - *Note: “Child Prostitution” is a legal definition; child prostitution is human sex trafficking.*
- Black women experience significantly higher rates of psychological abuse—including humiliation, insults, name-calling, and coercive control—than do women overall.²
- Black transgender people in the U.S. report rates of sexual harassment and assault up to **1.5x** greater than white transgender people, and as many as **50%** Black trans women experience sexual assault in their lifetime.³
- Nearly half of all Black/African/African American transgender people, **47%**, have been incarcerated, and incarcerated transgender individuals are **10x** as likely to be sexually assaulted by their fellow inmates, and **5x** as likely to be sexually assaulted by staff.^{4,5}
- More than **20%** of Black Women are raped during their lifetimes—a higher share among women overall.⁴
- According to the U.S. Department of Justice Bureau, between the years 2005 and 2010, African American girls 12 years old and older experienced **higher rates** of rape and sexual assault than White, Asian, and Latina girls and women.⁶
